Gabby has been released!

These past two years have been a real experience for all of us. We apologize for our silence, but due to being shorthanded and limiting some of our projects, we haven't printed a newsletter this year – until now.

At the sanctuary, our funding has dropped off as donors are afraid of what will happen next. We have had to stop our international and local volunteer programs for the protection of the humans and animals at the sanctuary. Our internship program has slowed to a crawl, but things are slowly improving.

Still, the animals need our care, and we must always find a way to meet their needs.

In October 2020, we received a call from the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries. They had a bear cub that needed our help. Just as Hurricane Delta was setting its sights on Louisiana, this little bear was orphaned. She and her mother were starving, and then her mother was hit by a

car. The wildlife officials knew we would be up to the challenge. We met their biologist halfway and brought the little bear to our sanctuary.

We named her *Gabby*. She was underweight, extremely malnourished and full of parasites, but she regained her strength and was successfully released back in Louisiana in April, 2021.

We have been receiving regular GPS collar Tracking information from the biologists in Louisiana, and she has settled into a beautiful, wild area of great black bear habitat.

A little good news goes a long way lately, right?



Five Lemurs Rescued from a Closed Attraction

The Nationwide teamwork of qualified animal rescue facilities benefits animals – again!

We are happy to announce the arrival **five ring-tailed lemurs** that needed a forever home. The facility where they were living has been closed and they will now receive excellent care for the rest of their lives at Forest Animal Rescue.

With everyone being so enthralled with the *Tiger King* series on Netflix, there has been additional awareness of the issues that wild animals face in captivity.

As a result, many roadside zoos and private 'menageries' have been closing their doors, with large numbers of animals needing placement all at once.

This is fantastic news for the animals that have lived their lives facing daily exploitation and mistreatment – but it poses a challenge for the animal rescue community when we are all impacted by the pandemic.

Nonetheless, Forest Animal Rescue is still managing to rescue animals that have nowhere else to go. When animals come from inappropriate captive situations, we provide them with the highest quality of <u>lifetime</u> care they could wish for in a <u>true sanctuary setting</u>.

They will never be exploited again. They will never be bred or sold and will remain with us for the rest of their lives in a natural habitat with state-of-the-art veterinary care and everything they need to live a full and happy life.

The lemurs didn't have names because they had no records when they arrived. We are estimating their ages through veterinary exams, and our supporters voted on names for them. The first pair are "Smokey and Bandit" – The second pair are "Maddie and Max" – and the solitary female is "Sunny." Soon they will all be spayed and neutered and introduced to our other resident lemurs in their large habitat.

These lucky lemurs will never be bred or exploited again. No more being held for photoshoots. No more breeding to have their babies taken away and sold as pets. They will stay in their family group at our sanctuary and will receive the highest quality of care for the rest of their lives.



We must be prepared

The story above is becoming more common. It seems like now more than ever; the general public is finally beginning to understand the issues facing wild animals in captivity.

From traveling circus acts being banned, to roadside attractions being pressured into closing, wild animals are finally beginning to get the respect they deserve.

Cub-petting operations and photo shoots are finally being seen as the tip of the iceberg, a sign of abuse that runs deeply through the wild animal trade. As the horrible places are closed down, the animals must have a place to go or they would be destroyed.

The abuse stops here...

Just as more roadside zoos and inappropriate places for animals are closing their doors, we are working to complete expansions and rescue the animals left behind. For the first time in their lives, the animals will experience a *true sanctuary*. They will be able to live out the rest of their lives in peace; knowing that the abuse and exploitation they have experienced is a thing of the past. **Will you help us?**

"Tiger Queens" Celebrates True Saviors for Captive Felines and Highlights the Dangers of Big Cat Pseudo-Sanctuaries

More tigers are held in captivity across the US than remain in the wild globally, estimates suggest. The Big Cat Sanctuary Alliance (BCSA) is a coalition of wildlife rescuers, reputable sanctuaries, and animal advocates working to eliminate the trade in "pet" wildcats and the commercial exploitation of exotic felines nationwide. Seeking to raise awareness about the plight of captive big cats held in inhumane conditions, the BCSA released a new video titled *Tiger Queens*.

Tiger Queens features an in-depth discussion among incredible women who have dedicated their lives and livelihoods to operating legitimate, fully accredited sanctuaries that provide lifetime care to rescued tigers, lions, leopards and other wild felids that have been saved from cruel conditions.


* Intern Spotlight *


Matthew Ostfeld, Animal Care intern
